Through this initiative, BreastfeedLA aims to address systemic issues, provide lactation education, and promote breast/chestfeeding as a strategy to combat food insecurity. By supporting breast/chestfeeding, it is possible to improve the overall well-being of both infants and mothers, alleviate financial strain on families, and build stronger, more resilient communities.	\$200,000

MEND's services include food distribution, community outreach, and case management. Funds will support MEND's Community Nourishment Programs, which distribute over 3 million pounds of food through a Food Pantry, Food Bank (supplying a network of SFV pantries), Buen Provecho Farmers Market, and Little Health Market, benefiting 269,000 food-insecure people. Health Consortium of Greater San Gabriel Valley, a program of Public Health Foundation Enterprises, Inc. dba Heluna Health	The Health Consortium of Greater San Gabriel Valley (Health Consortium) leads Food for All San Gabriel Valley (Food4All SGV) in partnership with five area hospitals. This project will expand sustainable access to medically tailored meals for Medi-Cal patients under CalAlM. Food4All SGV partner Project Angel Food will train healthcare partners on eligibility and referral processes, provide dedicated navigation for patients and referral partners, process referrals, onboard patients, and liaise with managed care health plans. HealthBegins LLC	HealthBegins' LA Food Equity BRIDGE program aligns regional stakeholders in LA County to implement food equity interventions, with an initial focus on increasing access to and utilization of medically tailored meals. The BRIDGE (Building Regional Initiatives to Develop and Grow Equity) model is a replicable framework for bringing together health plans, healthcare providers, community-based organizations, local health departments, and other key stakeholders to collaboratively tackle health equity challenges. To create a sustainable infrastructure and lasting change, the program guides BRIDGE members through estimating the potential benefits of collaboration, aligning on a shared SMART health equity goal, developing a comprehensive playbook for an intervention, piloting and refining the intervention, scaling the intervention across the entire membership, tracking progress, calculating the real outcomes and benefits of the intervention and collaboration, and sharing the results publicly. Concentrated efforts will focus on enhancing nutrition education and improving the food distribution environment for neighbors who visit pantries. LA Regional Food Bank will offer nutrition education classes and food demonstrations that equip neighbors with the knowledge and skills to make healthier food choices. Agencies will receive pantry equipment, food demonstration kits, and nutrition education materials.
